Number 2

Good morning, everyone. Today, we're going to talk about a question that scientists have been asking for a long time: why do we dream?

Every night, when we sleep, we have dreams. Sometimes, they're funny or strange. Other times, they can be scary or emotional. But even though dreams are a normal part of life, we still don't fully understand them.

One theory is that dreams help us figure out our emotions. For example, if you feel stressed or worried during the day, you might dream about something related to those feelings. The brain may be trying to make sense of your emotions while you sleep.

Another idea is that dreams help us solve problems. You've probably heard the phrase 'sleep on it.' Some people believe that when we dream, our brain continues to work on problems from the day—like studying for a test or thinking about a decision.

There's also a theory that dreams help us remember things. During sleep, the brain moves information from short-term to long-term memory. Dreams might be part of this process.

Of course, not all scientists agree. Some researchers think dreams are just random brain activity with no real purpose. But even this idea tells us something important: our brains are very active while we sleep.

So, the next time you have a strange dream, try to think about what it might mean. Was your brain trying to help you with a problem—or just having fun?
